ISLHD COVID-19 update

Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District (ISLHD) confirms 26 local residents have tested positive to COVID-19 in the 24 hours to 8pm last night.

Of the 26 new cases:

- 13 are from the Wollongong Local Government Area (LGA) 4 are linked to known cases
 - Postcodes 2500 (3), 2502 (2) 2506 (2), 2518 (4), 2519 (1), 2530 (1)
- 11 are from the Shellharbour LGA 5 are linked to a known case Postcodes – 2527 (9), 2528 (1), 2529 (1)
- 2 are from the Shoalhaven LGA 0 are linked to a known case Postcodes – 2541 (2)
- There are no new cases from the Kiama LGA

There have now been 2,262 local cases of COVID-19 in the Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District since the start of the current outbreak in June.

As at 8pm Saturday 16 October there were 35 COVID-19 patients being treated in hospital.

Venues are posted daily on the <u>District's Facebook page</u> and a full list of all exposure sites in NSW is available on the <u>NSW Health case locations web page</u>.

The community is reminded to remain vigilant for symptoms and get tested if any appear, no matter how mild. Symptoms include cold or flu-like symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough or shortness of breath. People with mild symptoms, such as fatigue, new muscle aches or pains, a change in taste or smell or a new runny nose, should also arrange testing as quickly as possible.

High rates of testing are critical to detecting transmission and preventing further spread of COVID-19 in the community.

There are a number of COVID-19 testing clinics across the Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District. Visit the <u>District's website</u> for a full list and updated opening hours and times.
