ISLHD COVID-19 update

Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District (ISLHD) is continuing to urge the community to get vaccinated and come forward for testing, after recording 7 positive COVID-19 cases in the 24 hours to 8pm last night.

Of the 7 new cases:

- 4 are from the Wollongong Local Government Area (LGA) - 3 are linked to known cases
Postcodes – 2518 (2), 2525 (1), 2526 (1)
- 1 is from the Shellharbour LGA and investigation are ongoing
Postcode - 2527 (1)
- 2 are from the Shoalhaven LGA – (1) is linked to a known case
Postcode – 2540 (2)

There have now been 2,376 local cases of COVID-19 in the Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District since the start of the current outbreak in June.

As at 8pm Monday 25 October, there were 23 COVID-19 patients being treated in hospital.

Sadly, NSW Health is reporting the death of a man in his 80s at Wollongong Hospital. He was unvaccinated. ISLHD extends sincere condolences to the man's loved ones.

The community is reminded to remain vigilant for symptoms and get tested if any appear, no matter how mild. Symptoms include cold or flu-like symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough or shortness of breath. People with mild symptoms, such as fatigue, new muscle aches or pains, a change in taste or smell or a new runny nose, should also arrange testing as quickly as possible.
