ISLHD COVID-19 update

Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District (ISLHD) has recorded 3 positive COVID-19 cases in the 24 hours to 8pm last night. While local numbers continue to remain low, the community is being reminded to stay vigilant and come forward for testing for even the mildest symptoms.

Of the 3 new cases:

- 2 are from the Wollongong Local Government Area (LGA) - 2 are linked to known cases
Postcodes – 2506 (1), 2517 (1)
- 1 is from the Shellharbour LGA – investigations are ongoing
Postcodes 2527 (1)

There have now been 2,431 local cases of COVID-19 in the Illawarra Shoalhaven Local Health District since the start of the current outbreak in June.

As at 8pm Sunday 31 October, there were 18 patients being treated in hospital as a result of COVID-19.

Remember to get tested if any symptoms appear, no matter how mild. These include; cold or flu-like symptoms such as fever, sore throat, cough or shortness of breath. People with mild symptoms, such as fatigue, new muscle aches or pains, a change in taste or smell or a new runny nose, should also arrange testing as quickly as possible.
